Being Our Best Selves



At Peter's Place we practice being our best selves—to meet the challenge of dealing every day with such a deeply affecting issue as death. Being our best selves means having the emotional agility to be available for the range of emotions our community members experience. Our *best* selves are kind when we meet this challenge. As an organization, and as a community this means completing our mission with integrity—in *everything* we do—and working to open our services to the needs of the community outside our walls.

There is so much to do. I am often reminded of the story in Buddhist scripture about the grieving mother and the mustard seed. When a mother loses her only son, she takes his body to the Buddha to find a cure. The Buddha asks her to bring a handful of mustard seeds from a family that has never lost a child, husband, parent, or friend. When the mother is unable to find such a house in her village, she begins to understand that there is no cure for death. She learns that it is ubiquitous and that what had happened to her also happened to everyone else. In finding out this lesson, she finds some comfort.

If I ever forgot this, I was reminded this year with the death of my own mother, Dolly Gaul. My Peter's Place community was the kindest place to be during these times and I have been even more grateful.

Peter Morsbach and those who loved him were the original reasons for beginning this place. The reasons go on and expand—with each new family and with each new person who supports us, reveals their story of loss, or calls on Peter's Place. These reasons brought us sorrow, but we are most agile together and find meaning and comfort by supporting each other.

Imagine what the understanding of grief facilitators, the knowledge of staff, the empathic and safe community of grieving peers can do for a child who has lost a parent. The children tell us in simple, compelling language what they experience and some of their words are here in this newsletter. And imagine what we can do for the community as we broaden our outreach—this too is reported in this newsletter. (see Peter's Place Outreach by Joseph Kelly)

Extending Our Services and Philosophy to the Community

As Peter's Place approaches its 6th anniversary, our continued growth is a tribute to the extraordinary philosophy that makes Peter's Place a special place. With the support of caring staff, generous and kind-hearted volunteers, and dedicated board members, we have been able to provide an empathic and warm environment to an ever growing number of grieving families. It is this effort *by* the community that enables us to extend *into* the community.

The 6 Reconciliation Needs of Mourning

1. Acknowledge the reality of the death.
2. Move toward the pain of the loss while being nurtured physically, emotionally, and spiritually.
3. Convert the relationship with the person from one of presence to one of memory.
4. Develop a NEW self-identity based on a life without the person who died.
5. Relate the experience of the death to a context of meaning.
6. Experience a continued supportive adult presence in future years.

Our Services 2006-2007

Peter's Place Support Groups served over 118 families over the course of the year. A total of 279 children and caregivers received support services in 24 different groups at our facility in Radnor. We ran (1) group for 3-5 year olds, (5) groups for 6-10 year olds, (2) groups for 11-13 year olds, (3) teen groups, (1) young adult group, and a special short-term group for survivors of suicide.

Intakes

Peter's Place experienced a 215% increase this program year from last in families seen

for intake appointments. Intake numbers were as follows:

Total number of families seen at intake: 62
Total number of adults and children combined seen at intake: 163
Total number of families enrolled in groups: 52
Total number of adults enrolled in groups: 60
Total number of children enrolled in groups: 75

Volunteers/Student Interns: Grief facilitators and general volunteers donated over 340 hours per month working at Peter's Place.

New Grief Facilitators trained: 14
Total number of Grief Facilitators: 42
Student Interns: 3
Total number of additional new volunteers working on-site: 6 Greeters/Intake Aids

Family Satisfaction Survey Numbers:

End of year surveys were completed by children and adults. The results were as follows:

90% said they feel better since coming to Peter's Place (10% feel the same)

93% of adults reported fewer negative feelings than at intake

Satisfaction with services rating (1-5, low to high)

Overall Satisfaction: 4.55
Adult satisfaction: 4.46
Child satisfaction: 4.46

Book Review

"The Knitting Circle" by Ann Hood

The Knitting Circle by Ann Hood is an intimate and semi-autobiographical portrayal of a mother's grief. Mary Baxter is a young mother and wife whose world is shattered when her daughter dies from meningitis at the age of 5. Mary is thrown into a world unknown to her—the world of grief. She spends her day vacillating between anger, incredible sadness, disbelief and loneliness. Upon the suggestion of her own mother, Mary joins a knitting circle. It is through the stories of the women in her circle, their individual stories of loss, hope and survival that Mary begins to learn to live with her grief.

Peter's Place had the great honor to host Ann Hood at our spring luncheon in May. Ann shared honestly and openly her story of grief and loss after the sudden death of her daughter. She said that after the death, she no longer found comfort from reading and writing—her previous means of escape. It was only after joining a knitting circle where she listened to others' stories and eventually shared her own that she was able to move with her grief and return to reading and writing. Ann's experience is not uncommon and a testament to why Peter's Place is essential in our community. Grief needs a voice! Peter's Place provides the space for the stories to be told.

Peter's Place Presents Anger Expression Research

In June, Peter's Place presented a workshop at the National Symposium on Children's Grief Support in Birmingham, Alabama entitled *Grief, Anger, and the Volcano Room* to a group of over 40 grief support professionals from around the country. Leah Klerr, graduate intern at Peter's Place, and Carrie Miluski discussed research conducted by Peter's Place. Leah's graduate thesis research, along with a review of current theory on anger expression.

The workshop included how Peter's Place staff, volunteers, and families participated in changing how Peter's Place helps children express anger. Volcano Rooms are one way that some grieving centers offer children to cope with anger—and a method previously used by Peter's Place, but phased out last year. Research shows that “venting” anger doesn't make you feel better, in fact, it can make the emotion stronger and increase one's tendency to act aggressively toward others. The group shared ideas for teaching kids safe and constructive ways of dealing with their anger inside and outside of grieving centers. One important step is helping children learn to recognize and name their anger and its source, and then identify assertive, not aggressive ways of getting their needs met.

I am pleased to report that as an organization, we are experiencing better times. This past year we have grown as a professional non-profit. We completed a strategic plan. Beginning with a new logo and stationary designs, we built a new web site, and produced a new brochure. We improved our accounting procedures, and upgraded and fully networked our computer systems. Thanks to the participation of IKEA and a group of families and volunteers, we redesigned the décor to make it brighter, more fun, and inviting for children.

Our program services have also changed as we standardized grief-work activities during support groups to offer children and adults more opportunities for expression and receiving support. We developed and delivered present and post graduate surveys for families to keep us knowledgeable of what helps from the perspective of the adults and children in our programs. We completed surveys and evaluation procedures for grief facilitators so that we understand their experience of Peter's Place. These last changes have made it possible to gather statistics on out-

comes and demographics—key to obtaining foundation grants.

We have grown measurably in terms of increasing our total assets and cash assets while keeping expenses in check.

In short, the work completed by staff, volunteers, and Board members this past year together has been nothing short of amazing.

Our founders placed this organization into our hands and I am proud to guard the mission. I am also proud that we have had the agility to adapt to change. We practice this agility every day as we try to find a way to talk about and deal with grief together. We cannot resolve our reason for being, there will always be more to do, and it does not stop. There are good times and challenges ahead, and times that may feel very difficult, but I celebrate our practice of being our best selves together and look forward to seeing how well this action brings comfort to the grieving children and families in our community.

educational and professional development training programs. Our presentations include: *Introduction to Grief and Culture*, *Responding to the Death of a Member of the School Community*, and *Grieving Children: Their Needs and Experiences at Different Ages*. Demonstrating the numerous creative group activities for children is a major component of our training. This way we foster a better understanding of grief and the tools professionals and parents can use to best support those who have experienced a death.

There has been exciting progress this summer, as I, along with Elise and Program Director, Carrie Miluski, have conducted programs at West Chester University and for the social workers in the West Chester School District. Trainings have also extended to a broader range of organizations, with recent outreach taking place at the Pennsylvania Prison Society in Philadelphia and the Crime Victims' Center of Chester County in West Chester, where homicide bereavement in children was discussed.

As the summer rolls on and the fall months approach, we at Peter's Place are extremely excited about the forthcoming development and growth of our outreach program. Our goals of consistently reaching and educating the community outside of the walls of the Peter's Place facility are beginning to be realized. As we move closer to achieving these goals, additional support from volunteers is welcome.
